**A Documentary**

The other day, I was watching something and a trailer came on for an upcoming documentary, *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* about the life of Mr. Fred Rogers. In the moment I heard the familiar music from *Mr. Roger's Neighborhood*, I was transported back to my childhood, sitting on my parents' bed, watching LPB (via antenna!) on a television that was smaller than my current computer screen. Those were the days!

In addition to being a television personality, writer, producer and musician, Mr. Rogers was also a Presbyterian minister.

Over a number of years, he used his lunch break to take classes at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. After graduating, he was ordained to serve the public through television. While his "ministry" was not traditional, there is no doubt that he reached a wide audience with a message of love and acceptance. Rogers was uniquely able to distill the message of Jesus in a way that was not explicitly "churchy," and in so doing, he was able to touch the hearts and lives of many who might never have been in a church.



The filmmaker responsible for this documentary, Morgan Neville, felt that what Mr. Rogers taught is still relevant today – some fifteen years after his death. "The Fred Rogers I discovered making this film is at once comfortably familiar and completely surprising," Neville said in a November interview. "I believe Mister Rogers is the kind of voice we need to hear right now."

I looked it up, and *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* is set to open in Baton Rouge on July 6. While I am not one to frequent the movie theater, this film is one that I would like to see. So, I thought I would see if there are any other Mr. Rogers fans out there who might be interested in watching this documentary. It might be fun to get a BPC group together and go watch it! We still have a month, so if you are interested, please let me know.

**Points of Interest from the Session Meeting**

► BPC's overall financial status is favorable; within budget. April 2018 pledge and offering receipts were below budget; yet, monthly expenditures were well under budget.

► Mindful Movers will use the Activities Building three days a week for the month of June. This is a summer camp for children, ages 3-7. Yoga, Spanish, steam, art and sports will be offered.

► The Session "green-lighted" a 2:00 p.m. Wednesday bible study led by Pastor Barrett and open to everyone.

► The Session okayed reviving a Sunday evening Bible study group

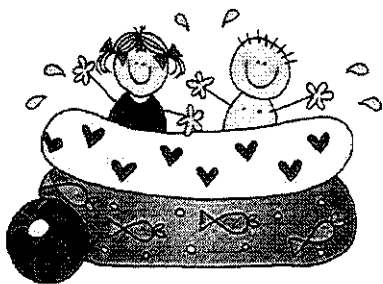
**Children's Ministry News**

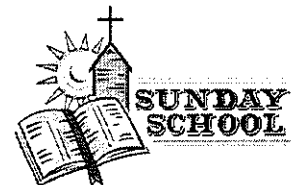


**Adult and Youth Classes**

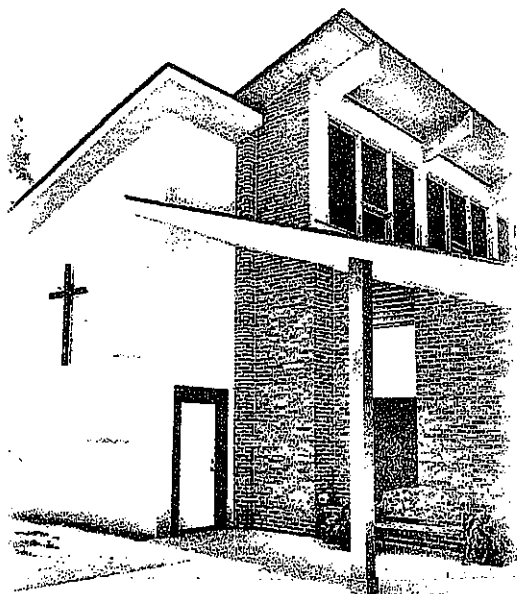

## "The Church in Cuba Today" by Mariano Hinojosa



My first Sunday in Cuba took me to a Presbyterian church on the outskirts of Havana. An exuberant charismatic revival was clearly in progress. The church was crammed full; no empty seats anywhere. People of all ages were standing in the front, back and along the walls.

Although conditions have improved, being a Christian in Cuba is still a risky business. No one witnesses without peril. Hence, most Cuban Christians are willing to be martyrs in the classic sense of that word. This charges every baptismal decision, even every church service, with radical seriousness. It helps the church to understand precisely its most important task and to examine all other options accordingly. Cuban believers are learning firsthand where their most compelling accountability lies: to their risen Lord.

I was ushered to the front row and squeezed into a crowded pew. People were praying aloud with an unpretentious abandon that caught me off guard. The Lord's Table was set. An electric keyboard and a guitar accompanied the singing.

As the spirited praise music increased, kids from the street began peering in the open windows. A whole baseball team of adolescent eyes were transfixed by the communion service, scrutinizing every move, every syllable.

A small group of singers led congregational singing. Younger kids especially joined in with heartfelt praise, hands held high. This was a family event, a neighborhood happening.

I could see that a dynamic, no-nonsense revival was taking place. Contrition, repentance, faith, and new birth were in the air. It was a scene that could not be faked, truly a work of God. Emotion flooded my heart. These were my brothers and sisters—members of the body of Christ in which I live and breathe. The sermon was as ardent as the prayers and singing. Its focus: We are in a war with Satan. We already know the end,

but the struggle goes on. You are invited to make a decision. It could be the most important decision of your life: accept Jesus in your heart. Trust Him for forgiveness of your sins.

Whatever the ideological obstacles, they are not blocking the work of the Holy Spirit in Cuba. No human power can do that. There is an incurable religiousness embedded in the Cuban consciousness. It has been there all along, frozen for decades by the socialist revolution, but now showing itself as a vigorous survivor, like a seed planted in winter.

It is the Cuban youth who are leading their people in religious revival. The movement is youth-led because it is the hopes of youth that have been most fiercely undermined by the regime. Even state-managed television, replete with the bravado of socialist ideology, is less interesting than self-made music, dancing, reading, self-education, and family entertainment.

The air in the city streets is tinted purple, dusted by diesel smoke. Loud motor noises deafen ears and drown nearby human voices. Cars whiz down narrow streets, barely missing dogs and pedestrians.



I recall the surreal image of a wiry man on a bicycle carrying a large, unwieldy oil drum on his back, with the bike creaking and groaning beneath. There was a lot of movement on the street, more trucks than cars, and much more walking or cycling than driving. The streets were dotted with droppings from horses pulling carts and carriages.

Economically, Cuba seems to be running on empty. The fall of the Soviet Union spelled the end to Cuba's main supply of oil, grain, and other essential resources.

I saw long lines of people in the city

waiting to buy meat. They had pesos, but there is little food available, even if you have the money. Something was dying in that town square. What was it? A system? An economy? A dream? A rhetoric? Perhaps, a revolution? In a construction dumpster, I observed fragments of old revolutionary posters now shredded and mildewing. But the Cuban protestant church remains standing amid this collapse of ambitious human schemes—a testimony to the mighty God who never left.

Today, I sit at home in Baton Rouge, far away from the peculiar sights and odors of my Caribbean journey. But the spirited and profound voices of my Cuban brothers and sisters continue to play in my mind and heart. I know now that what I experienced was not just a church regaining vision in an ailing socialist regime; what I experienced was a firsthand view of the power and triumph of the Living God over the chains of the Enemy.

For nearly 60 years, Cuba has been the only state in the Western Hemisphere where the government was openly atheistic and determined to erase Christianity. But, despite intense police repression, this attempt has been singularly unsuccessful.

No one knows what the political future might hold for the people of Cuba. What the church is sure of is that it will continue to accompany the ordinary Cuban people into whatever circumstances or along whatever path they may be hurled. One of the retired Presbyterian pastors told me, "Cuba is not yet fully ready to hope, but the Cuban church must take the responsibility of offering hope where there is none."

I believe that the Cuban church has a passion for the possible. It is the salt that has not lost its savor.

I would like to thank all the people who helped to set up for the Presbyterian Women's Spring Birthday Luncheon on Saturday, May 12, 2018.

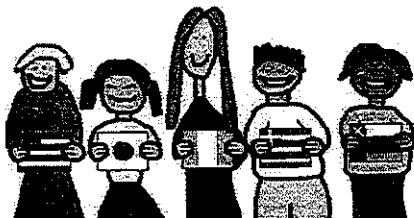


